### Luke 12:13-21

In Luke 12, Jesus tells the parable of a \_\_\_\_\_ man who \_\_\_\_\_ unexpectedly and missed out on \_\_\_\_\_.

#### 1. He Was a \_\_\_\_\_ Man. 12:16-18
